
### June's Mount Vernon Field Trip






## INVITATIONAL COMMITTEE DECEMBER 12<sup>th</sup> HOLIDAY TEA Julie Williams, Chair

## New Horticulture Guidelines for the Club

As most of you know, we had a very successful Flower Show last May. Members brought in 120 horticulture specimens. When added to the number of specimens brought in at the general meetings, the total was almost 240. That is something the club can be proud of. Nearly every member made their required contribution of two horticulture specimens per year.

For new members, don't forget that club rules require you to bring in at least two horticultural exhibits each year. It's not hard to find something in your garden that is at the peak of bloom, or a good-looking conifer branch and bring it in. Club members always enjoy seeing what other members grow. There are a few guidelines to remember when bringing in horticulture, and we are in the process of writing those up in a handbook for members.

At our May flower show, the judges loved the condition and variety of our horticulture, but agreed that we could do better at naming our plants correctly, that is, using the proper botanical name, underlining that part of it that is in Latin, and enclosing cultivar names in single quotation marks. This is not nearly as hard as it sounds. If you know the common name or if you know part of the Latin name, google what you know, "botanical name for ...", and you will almost always get the correct answer. If that doesn't work, the members of the Horticulture Committee will help you identify the plant. The judges have challenged us to be better, so let's make the effort.







### **New Entry Cards**

This year the Board has decided that we will use the official National Garden Clubs flower show entry cards at our regular club meetings, instead of index cards. Below is a picture of the NGC flower show entry card and instruction on filling out the card.

We have ordered plenty of entry cards and they will be available at the horticulture table during meetings. Please take a few so you can fill them out in advance.

### Here is how to fill out the entry card.

Please use a **PENCIL**, so that any corrections can be made easily, without throwing away the card.

- 1. Flower Show: "RSGC meeting".
- 2. Date: use the month of the meeting.
- 3. Division/Section/Class No./Entry No.: leave blank. This is for standard flower shows and refers to the flower show schedule.
- 4. Variety or class name: Enter the botanically correct name for the plant, e.g. <u>Spiraea japonica</u>, and the cultivar, if known, on the line below, e.g. 'Goldmound'.
- 5. Exhibitor/Address/Club **above the perforated line**: fill in your name. The rest of this section can be left blank.
- 6. Exhibitor/Address/Club **below the perforation**: fill in your name, leave the rest blank. Horticulture Committee members will collect these stubs and give you credit for bringing in an exhibit.
- 7. Do not fill in any information on the back of the card.
- 8. When you have filled out all the information, bend the card up and forward along the perforated line and slip the edge under the notch. This way the judges will not see your name.

Please take a few moments to read the judge's comments. These are meant to help members know what the judges are looking for.

**Note**, this year we will put an **X** next to any botanical names that are incorrect. If you do not understand why an X was placed next to the plant name, ask one of the Horticulture Committee members. It is usually something simple, like forgetting to underline the Latin portion of the name or forgetting to put **single** quotation marks around cultivar names.
